8.4	 Major Project Update Ian Sheppard Redbank Project Batter Erosion Protection A Contract has been awarded to Pan Civil Pty Ltd, for the installation of MacMatR Erosion Protection matting and the revegetation of the cut batters along the length of the new Rail Deviation. This work commenced early March 2014 and is planned to complete early May 2014. First stage of the work is the application of a revegetation medium which adheres to the flaking shale and limits weathering affects yet promoting vegetation growth. Work has commenced with a trial application and all batter slopes will be sprayed over the next 2 weeks. Second stage involves the covering of the batter slopes with 21,000 square meters of MacmatR Erosion Protection matting. This mat will be fixed to the batter faces with anchors spaced a 1 meter intervals, securing the surface while allowing vegetation to grow. 	
Q6	Have gabions at Redbank Deviation Project been replaced to stop the scouring of batter during rain event?	
A6	 Yes, final rectification work has been completed. Redbank Creek Culvert Strengthening Review of Environmental Factors (REF) completed Dec 2012 and Controlled Activity Approval (CAA) from Dept. of Water in place to facilitate access to creek area. Blockages and silt build-up removed, culvert clear and flowing as normal Strengthening works to commence May 2014 - involving stainless steel hoop reinforcement embedded in culvert brickwork. Coffer dams will be installed to contain any contaminants. Normal Creek flows will be maintained by installing a bypass drainage pipe through the work area. Stop work arrangements for predicted storm events will be implemented. Work scheduled for completion Oct 2014.
