The criteria for dissolved metals are the default guideline values for protection of 95% of freshwater species from toxicants in the Australian and New Zealand Guidelines for Fresh and Marine Water Quality 2018 (ANZG 2018). This corresponds to classification of the Bargo and Nepean Rivers as slightly to moderately disturbed ecosystems. Barium is not specified in ANZG but has been found to precipitate along Tea Tree Hollow Creek. The criterion for barium is from the Guidelines for Managing Risks in Recreational Water, NHMRC 2008, Section 9.4. The discharge must also contain unsaturated levels of barium to avoid precipitation downstream of the discharge point.
